<p>To provide high quality phonics teaching</p> <p>Little Wandle subscription and resources</p>	<p>Increase the % of children reaching the expected standard in the phonics screening and provide high quality intervention where necessary.</p>	<p>1. Phonics has a positive impact overall (+5 months) with very extensive evidence and is an important component in the development of early reading skills, particularly for children from disadvantaged backgrounds.</p> <p>2. The teaching of phonics should be explicit and systematic to support children in making connections between the sound patterns they hear in words and the way that these words are written.</p> <p>3. The teaching of phonics should be matched to children's current level of skill in terms of their phonemic awareness and their knowledge of letter sounds and patterns (graphemes).</p> <p>4. Phonics improves the accuracy of the child's reading but not necessarily their comprehension.
